

THIS INDENTURE, made the 17th day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty seven between George Branner Overseers of the Poor for the district of the county of Rockingham of the one part, and Jacob Beam of said county, of the other part, witnesseth, that the said George Branner Overseers of the Poor as aforesaid, by virtue of an order of the Court of the aforesaid county, bearing date the 4th April day of Court 1847 have put, placed and bound, and by these presents do put, place and bind William Beam of the age of fourteen years, to be an apprentice with him the said Jacob Beam — and as an apprentice with him the said Jacob Beam — to dwell, from the date of these presents until the said William Beam shall attain the age of 21 years, according to the act of the General Assembly in that case made and provided. By and during which time and term, the said William Beam shall the said Jacob Beam — his said master, well and faithfully serve, in all such lawful business as the said William Beam shall be put unto by his said master, according to the power, wit and ability of him the said William Beam and honestly and obediently in all things shall behave himself towards his said master, and honestly and orderly towards the rest of the family of the said Jacob Beam — And the said Jacob Beam — for his part, for himself, his executors and administrators, doth hereby promise and covenant to and with the said Overseers of the Poor, and every of them, their and every of their executors and administrators, and their and every of their successors for the time being, and to and with the said William Beam that he the said Jacob Beam shall instruct the said William Beam in the craft, mystery and occupation of a Shoemaker which he the said Jacob Beam — now uses, after the best manner that he can or may, teach, instruct and inform, or cause to be taught, instructed and informed as much as thereunto belongeth, or in any wise appertaineth. And that the said Jacob Beam — shall also find and allow unto the said apprentice sufficient meat, drink, apparel, washing, lodging, and all other things needful or meet for an apprentice, during the term aforesaid. And also that the said Jacob Beam — shall teach, or cause to be taught, to the said William Beam reading, writing and common arithmetic including the rule of three, and will, moreover, pay the said William Beam the sum of Twenty Dollars at the expiration of the aforesaid term. In witness whereof, the parties have interchangeably set their hands and seals to these presents the day and year first above written.
