

THIS INDENTURE

MADE THE 2nd day of *July* in the year of our Lord 1837 Between

Peter Sturton one of the Overseer of the Poor of the *first* District in the County of Rockingham of the one part and *Philip Cole* of the

other part witnesseth, that the said Overseers of the Poor by virtue of an Order of the Court of the County aforesaid bearing date the *10th day of July 1837* in the year 1837 has placed and bound and by these presents doth place and bind *Joseph Moore* of the age of *10* years to be an Apprentice with him the said *Philip Cole*

and as an Apprentice with him the said Philip Cole to dwell from the date of these presents, until the said Joseph Moore shall arrive, and come to the age of 21 years, according to the Act of the General Assembly in that case made and provided. For and during

all which time and term the said Joseph Moore shall the said Philip Cole well and faithfully serve in all such

lawful Business as the said Joseph Moore shall be put unto by his said Master according to the Power, Wit and Ability of the said Moore

and the said Moore honestly and obediently in all things behave towards the said Philip Cole

and honestly and orderly towards the rest of the Family of him the said Philip Cole And the said Philip Cole for himself his Executors and

Administrators doth hereby promise and covenant to and with the said Overseer of the Poor and his Successor in office for the time being that the said Apprentice shall in the Craft, Mystery and Occupation

of a farmer which he the said Philip Cole now useth, after the best manner that he can, or may teach, instruct, and inform,

or cause to be taught, instructed and informed, as much as thereunto belongeth, or in any wise appertaineth, and that he the said Philip Cole shall also find

and allow unto the said Apprentice sufficient meat, drink, apparell, washing, lodging, and all other things needful or meet, for an Apprentice during the the term aforesaid: And also that the said Philip Cole

shall teach, or cause to be taught to the Joseph Moore Reading, Writing and Common Arithmetic including the Rule of Three

and will moreover pay to the said Joseph Moore the Sum of Twenty Dollars at the Expiration of the aforesaid Term.
