

Rockingham County to wit.

To the Sheriff of Laid County, Whereas Charles a Negro Slave late the
property of Robert Foster, was this day committed to the Gaol of this County by
my warrant, it appearing to me that the Felonious offence wherewith he stands
charged, ought to be examined into by the County Court. Therefore on behalf of
the Commonwealth, I require you ~~that~~ that you summon at least eight of
the Justices of your Laid County to meet at the Courthouse on the seventh
day of January next (being Saturday) And then & there to hold a court for
the examination of the fact, with which the Laid Negro Slave Charles
stands charged, and for such other purposes concerning the premises as
is by law required and directed. And that you have then there this Warrant.

To the Sheriff or Jailor of Rockingham County No. 1.

These are to command and require you, in the name of the Commonwealth, to receive into your Jail the body of Charles a Negro Slave—the property of Robert Foster of Laid County taken and brought before me for felony and Burglary by him committed, in breaking and entering the ~~steal~~ Store of John Graham of Harrisonburg in Laid County Merchant, on the Night of this instant about Six or Seven o'clock P.M. as appears with felonious intentions &c. And You are hereby commanded to keep the said Charles safely in your Jail and custody without bail or Mainprise until he shall be thence discharged by due course of Law

The Deposition of the witness taken on the trial of Charles
a Negro man Slave, for Burglary before Court held the 7th of
January 1815.

John Graham Jr. Deposeth and saith that, on the night of the 30th of December 1814, about 6 or 7 o'clock, in the evening, he laid in his father's store, with an intention to wait for some person, whom he believed had before entered the store, and later than ~~the~~ among them said that he had not laid but a short time, before he heard some persons come to the front door of the store whom he afterwards found to be Charles the prisoner, that ~~he~~ ^{and others} ~~had~~ ^{and cryed out that he has got the thief} put a key into the lock of the door, and unlocked the same, and entered the house, and advanced towards the draw where the money was kept, that at that moment this defendant jumped out and locked the door ^{from the outside} with the same key which the prisoner had ~~put~~ put in the door, upon which the prisoner ran to the other door which entered the store, but could not get it open, in consequence of this defendant holding ^{from the outside} the door, upon which one of the persons asked for an ax, on which the prisoner ran to Middle ^{a Window} door within the store, ~~where~~ ⁱⁿ the upper part of which door was ~~the~~ search with glass in it, which he broke ~~the~~ ^{the glass}, and run up stairs, and gained one of the windows, and got on the roof of the porch, upon which, ~~in~~ this defendant ^{did} call out that it was Charles the prisoner, upon which this defendant came round, and saw the prisoner on the roof afraid, and call for a gun, and the prisoner ^{made to the end of the porch} jumped off the corner into a hog pen, and attempted to cross the fence near Thomas Sullivan, where he was caught by Mr. G. Delaney, - this defendant further saith that the door produced in court is, the same ^{the inner door and} that belonged to the store, and that after the said Charles was apprehended, he with other persons ^{of} found glass in his head, and that there was a cut on the ^{left} side of his face ~~and~~ which appears to have been cut with the breaking of the glass in the door aforesaid; that near the door aforesaid was found a black hat with a ^{left} handkerchief, which he believes to be the prisoner, this defendant further saith that it was too dark for him to tell who the person was when

he first entered the store; — being asked how the second door that opens into the store was fastened, answered it was with ~~a bar of wood~~ across it, and ~~and also~~ a propt — which the prisoner required, and then attempted to pull the door open, but which this defendant pursued by his holding it from the out side; this defendant further saith that the inner ^{or Pottoe} door was Locked with ^{a stock and} pad Lock, this defendant further saith that he has a candle in his hand, and see the prisoner on the porch, who jumped off, in the manner of escaped, this defendant being asked if he slept in the store, answered that he did, and had done so ever since it was removed to that house (except the time he was at Norfolk) ^{now ago he no that his father ever Lodged in} he also states that the store is the property of his father the defendant further saith that just such a pad Lock he purchased from Mr. J. Kyle, as that found in the persons possession, that on inquiry of the prisoner how he comes by said Lock, he said he had purchased it for Mr. M. Lever, — being asked if the Prisoner did not frequent the store for such articles as was wanting, answered that he had been there and got there &c being asked if he was the first person that went into the store after Charles was taken, answered that he was, that he went up stairs and as he came down, observed there was ~~the~~ his hat, picked it up and handed it to Mr. Garrison, being asked whether the store house was affixed to the it was not, that the store house is situated about 11 feet from it, with a street between Jacob Legget's sworn deposition also saith that on the night of the 30th of December 1814, ~~but~~ when the alarm was given about the breaking of the store, he runs to the store as aforesaid, that he saw the prisoner on the roof of the store porch, and that he jumped off, in the manner disputed by Mr. Graham, this defendant further saith that he saw a number of small pieces of glass in the prisoners head, when he was before the magistrate, that he also saw a small cut on his face, and on his hand which appears to have been done with glass, this defendant further saith that ~~the~~ he is confident that Charles the prisoner, is the same person he saw on the porch, that when he first jumped off the porch, it was into a hog pen (near the end of the porch) ^{in which} he made a short stop, & this defendant being asked if he knew the hand produced in court, answered that he ~~did~~ believe it was made in his shop, which was sold to one Bentley James A. a man of colour —

Thomas Larahan being sworn Deposits and saith that on the
night of the 30th ultimow, he heard Mr. John Graham Jr. call out
he had tho ~~sheep~~ sheep, that he run to the store, and after some
time he tho deponent went ^{with others} to the back of the store, that he
had been there but a few moments ^{when} a Negroe jumped of the
end of the porch, into the hog pen, (who tho deponent believes
to be ~~that~~ Charles the Prisoner), ^{but cannot be certain it being very dark} that when he ~~got~~ into the hog pen
the deponent advanced thoro, and the prisoner made his way over
the railings betwixt Culverin and Vanpelt, and as he jumped the
railings ^{the deponent} made a stroke at him, and so call'd out that he
was making his way ^{through} Culverin yard, and in a moment tho
deponent was inform'd he was caught; being asked if he saw
any person at the back side of the house, answered that he did not
(except those that went with him), he is also confident that the
person that jumped into the hog pen was a black man —

Sergeant Larahis deponent saith, that on the 30th of ultimow, he
caught ~~the~~ Charles the prisoner off the bar, / just after he had
got off over ^{Graham} ~~the~~ fence, that he saw him geting over the
fence, he further saith that when he he caught him he did
not ^{know} who it was, but that he kept hold of the ^{said} prisoner,
untill he ^{brought him} to the light, ^{which was} about 10 or 12 feet from the place,
and found it to be (Charles the prisoner.)

Lor William

Levy Spangler deports^s, saith, that on the night of the 30th December last, he was at the door of John Graham, that he saw some person on the porch, that he saw something on his head which appeared like blood, ~~but~~ and that the said person jumped off the porch into the hogpen, after that he saw no more of him until he was caught, ~~at about~~ and at that time he is confident that it was a steel comb that was in his head and not blood as first supposed, he further saith that he distinctly saw the comb as he jumped off the porch, he also saith that he saw the person on the porch, come out of one of the windows or to the porch —

Mrs. Harriet Graham deports^s, saith that on the night of the 30th December 1814, she came out of her father's house, with a candle in her hand, that the person had the window ^{in the up stairs of the slave house} open, ~~with~~ one foot out, that she cried out here he comes, upon which he ~~open~~ ~~got~~ ~~and let~~ ~~the~~ ~~down~~ ~~and drew back~~ ~~into~~ ~~the~~ ^{whilst he was on the porch} ~~the~~, she further saith that she distinctly see a steel comb in his head, upon which she said she believed and is confident it was Charles the person, —

James Ailes being sworn saith, being asked if he knows the hat produced in court, said to belong to the person, answered that he did, ~~know~~ that it is the same hat that Charles the person got of this deponent, being asked if he was confident that it was ~~the~~ ^{his} ~~hat~~ ~~he~~ ^{the} ~~same~~ ~~hat~~ that he believe it was.
