Henry Hillier on the note Saturday week last
 note - when a Dr. store Casson wished to pledge the note for
 \$2 as the funds was pushing him - after he came out of the store
 witness asked the C if he would trade the note he answered he
 did not like to part with it he did not want to push the
 Franks for the money as he had promised not to push them
 against the debt and two dollars but agreed to take the
 note and three dollars witness knew the man to be good and
 did not ask a question - The Prisoner said it was a good note
 and the man who worth \$500 said he had worked for Briggs & Briggs
 had given him this note - contracted for the note but before he paid
 he inquired about the Franks - He gave a letter worth \$5 or 2 and
 three dollars in cash - sold to Morris before he paid - witness promised
 not to push Franks but made no bargain with Morris not to push, sold
 it for \$15 in trade and three dollars in cash - his suspicions were

the felonious offence wherewith he stands charged, viz. ^{uttering as true for his own use & with intent to injure & defraud Henry S. Williams son of} ~~feloniously~~
^{forfeigning a note on David H. Williams} ~~payable to John Rife~~
^{knowing it not to be true} ~~for five Dollars~~ ^{and paying the same to Henry Williams}
the 3rd day of April 1824, Ought to be examined into by the County
Court, therefore On behalf of the Commonwealth, I require you,
that you summon at least eight of the Justices of your said County
to meet at the Court house, on the 12th ~~Instant~~ day of April 1824
And then and there to hold a court of examination of the fact, with
which the said Jesse Jackson stands charged, and for such other
purposes concerning the premises, as is by law required And directed;
And that you leave these these this warrant

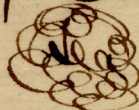

These are to command you to receive into your jail and custody
the body of Jesse Jackson of the County aforesaid charged before me
On the Oath of Henry Williamson & Henry Dooz with felamancy
for giving a Note on David P. Williams Frank payable to John Rife for
Twenty five Dollars and passing the same to Henry Williamson on
the 3rd instant and you the said Jailor are hereby required to receive
the said Jesse Jackson into your custody in the said jail, and him
there safely to keep until he shall there be discharged by any
court of law

~~This day~~ Whereas Henry Williamson of the Town of Harrison
-age in the county of Rockingham aforesaid, hath this day made
oath before me Joseph Cravens a Justice of the peace for said
county that he hath good cause to suspect and doth suspect
that Jesse Jackson of said county (Labourer), did feloniously
and falsely make forge, counterfeit a certain ~~certain~~ note
in manuscript purporting to be a note of hand or single
bill for Twenty five dollars, made by David Frank
and William Frank under seal, due six months
after date, to John Rife, and dated, January 12th 1824
for Value received, - With intent to defraud, and did
pass the same to the said Henry Williamson on the third
day of this present month, for a valuable consideration
in the said Jesse Jackson, calling himself by the name
of John Rife the obligee in said note - There are therefore
to command you to apprehend the said Jesse Jackson
and bring him before me or some other Justice of the peace
for said county of Rockingham forthwith to answer the
premises and further to be dealt with according to law.
