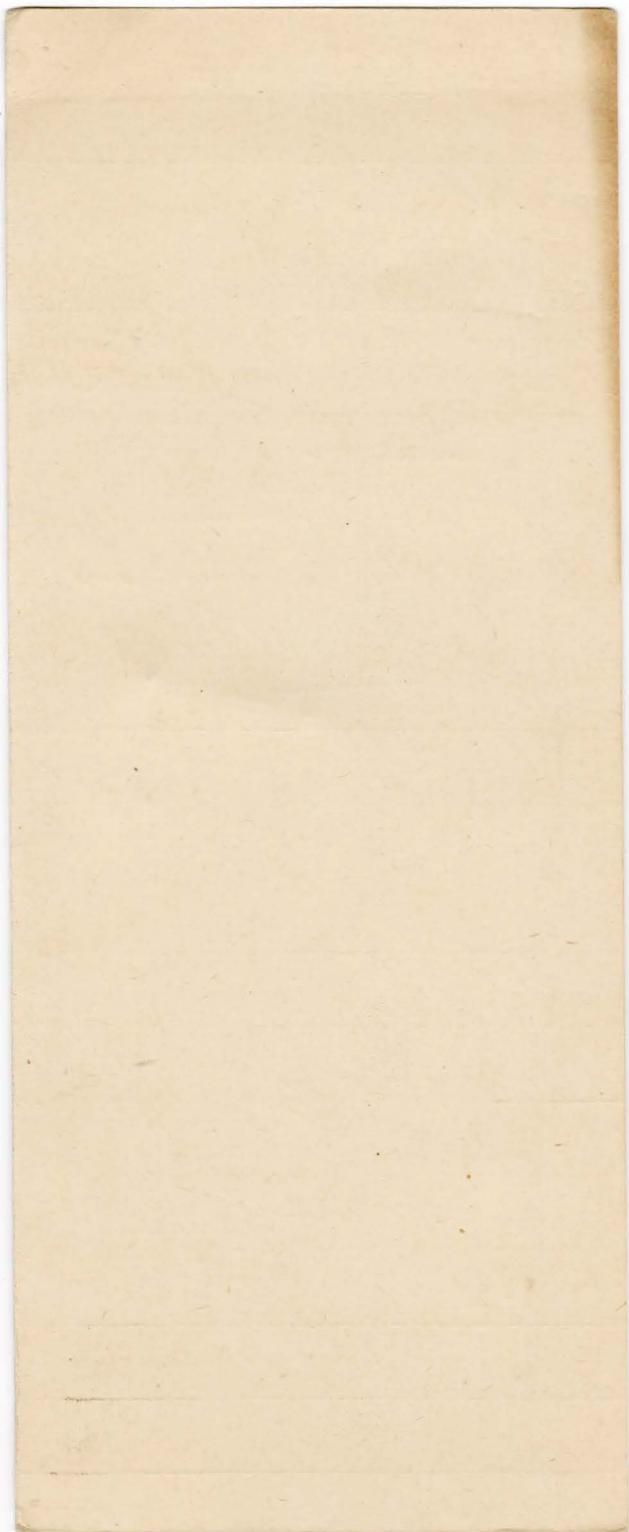

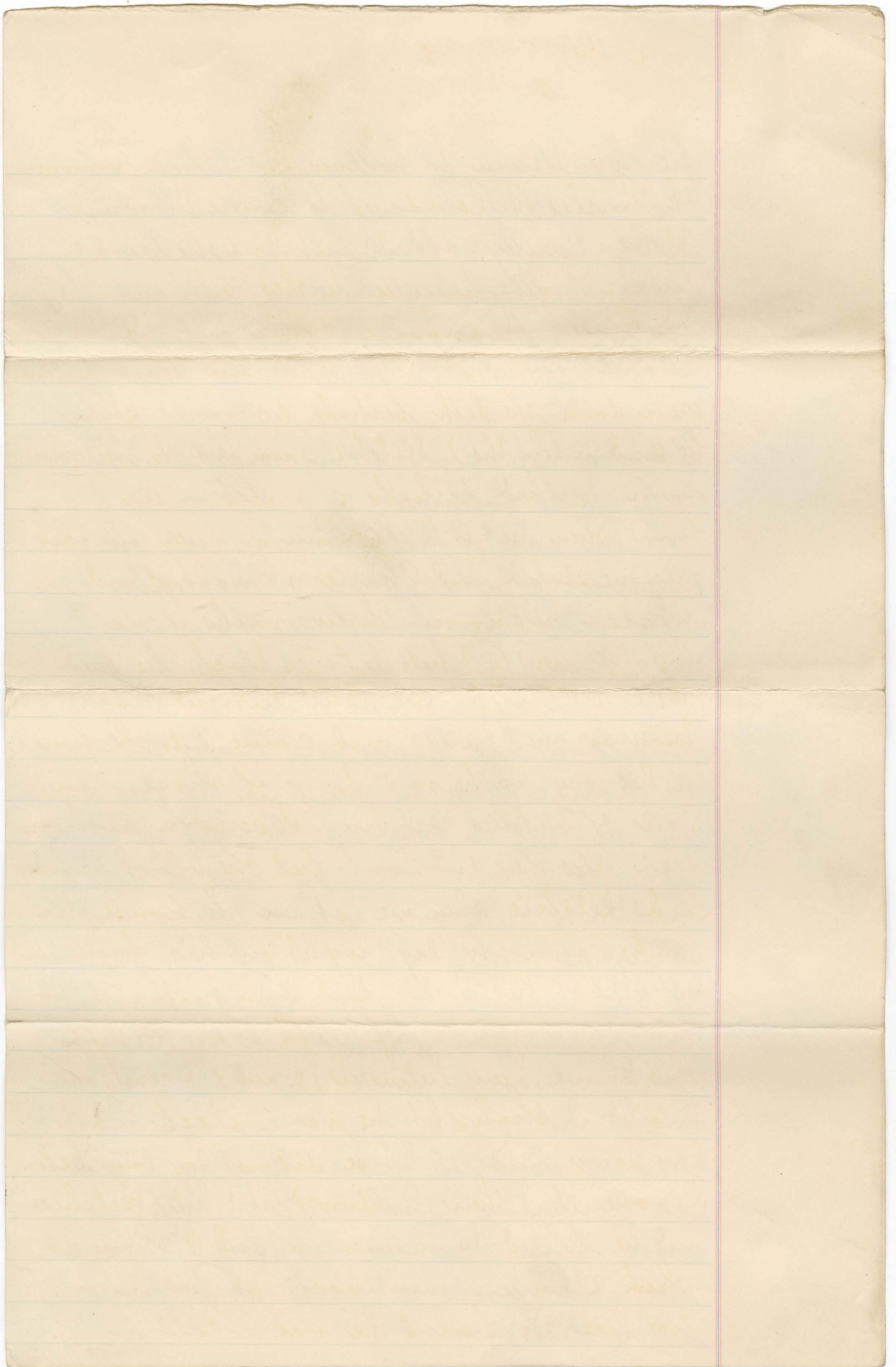

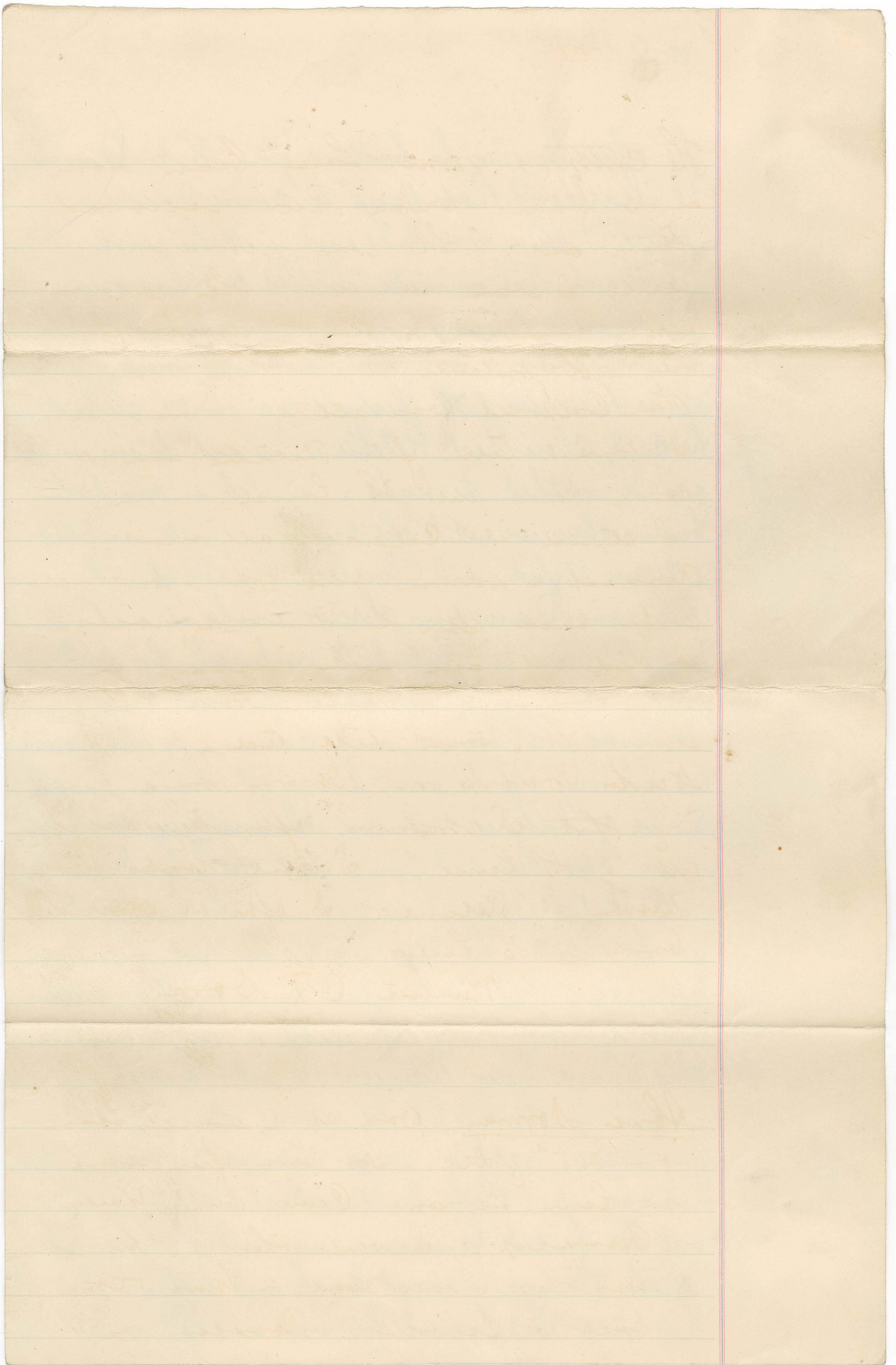
Deposition of witnesses taken at
the dwelling house of Newton Caldwell
in the County of Rockingham, on the 27 day
of December, 1906. before me and my
jury of inquest upon view of the body
of Philip Ritchie there lying dead,

Minrod C. Dove being duly sworn
deposes as follows.

"I was with Philip Ritchie on the
evening of the 25 day of December 1906,
went with him from Geo. H. Brady's house
to his home, about 10 o'clock at night
Ismael Brady was with me. when we
arrived at his house we took him into
the house, when he went in he fell down
and we helped him up he went up stairs
and was in good humor was up stair
short time and ^{came down and} said, let's all take a drink
he offered Sallie Shannaker a drink
and she refused "saying St. Donovan
had given her a drink," he Philip
Ritchie became mad and began to rave
and said he was coming down here and
clean up the patch or die, he then invited
me to come with him, I then came
with him, when we got there he came
in and broke a lamp all to pieces
with a stick



he then began to hallow for Shner Donovan
and Charles B. Roadcup to come down
stairs, I then walked out into the yard
in about five minutes Charles B. Roadcup
and Shner Donovan came out, and Philip
Ritchie came out after them and then followed
them down the path perhaps 25 or 30 steps
he said when he & Ritchie came out to me come
on. I walked perhaps a step or two behind
him when we got to the drain or gully on this
side we stopped, and Charles B. Roadcup and
Shner Donovan threw rocks at us
I said then to Phil. lets go back, he said
then all right, we then turned back
towards the house, and came into the house
on his way up he said, some of those damned
Sons of bitches cut me, and said a reck on
not" Yes they did for I feel the blood running
said Ritchie when we got in the house he
sank down, he lay right on his face on
left side of his face, I put some kind of pillow
under his head out of cloth or rag, I suppose
this to have been between 12 and 1 o'clock at
night, I thought he was a sleep and I
lay down side of stove did not lay long before
I woke up I then hallowed at Philip Ritchie
and he failed to answer me, and I thought
that strange, I went back and felt on his
his face and found he was a dead man

Misc The cutting wood-work been done in the house before Ritchie followed them out. It was not done while I was in there. They were not close enough to him to do it after they got outside.

Mrs. Caldwell was asleep so far as I know till after Ritchie and I come back into the house.

I staid at Caldwell's all night.

Roadcap + Dorrian both left + did not come back after they threw the rocks. I did not see either Roadcap or Dorrian have a knife. Have not seen them since till today.

Neither Roadcap nor Dorrian said any thing that I remember after they came out of the house. Several rocks were thrown at Ritchie + I after we started back to the house.

Abner Dorrian. Was at Caldwell's house on 25th of Dec. Got here after dark an hour or so. Came with Charles Roadcap. I went then to Phil Ritchie's was there awhile about 2 hours + come back to Caldwell's. Roadcap was still

Here. We talked of going down + Mrs
Caldwell asked us to stay all night -
that she was afraid to stay by herself
+ that we could go up + go to bed
that was about - 10 or 11 o'clock
+ we went up. Not in bed so very
long till Philip Ritchie + Jim Dore
came + followed for Mrs Caldwell
to get-up + make a light - + she
did so + Ritchie asked her who
was here. She said Ah Dominion
+ Charlie Roadcap are up stairs
in bed. Ritchie called for Roadcap
+ told him to get-out-of here or
he would kill him. Roadcap called
back "The what's the matter with you"
The said God damn you, you
get-out-of here. So we got-up
+ come down. I come in front -
+ walked on out-by him he was standing
there by the front-door with a club in
his hand when I asked him what-
was the matter with him. He said
that God damn pop eyed son of
a bitch has got-to get-out-of here
I walked on out - + Charlie was in
the room hunting for his cap before
I went-out - + as I walked out -
I walked on out - over the porch to my
left - + stopped + looked back towards
the door. Charlie was backing out -
the door + Ritchie had the club

down on his head. Could not
say as to size of it. Just as
Roadcap got on porch Ritchie
struck at him with the Club & swore
he would smash his head for him.
I saw Roadcap throw his arm up
& looked to me as if to knock the
lick off. Then Charles backed to
the left toward me, Ritchie still
following with the Club down on
his head. We Charlie & I started
toward the path she followed
us down the path 25 or 30 yds
I guess. ~~But~~ Roadcap then told
Ritchie to stop & he would not
& Roadcap then threw a rock
& I threw one. We walked away
& Ritchie & Dove were standing below
the Louse this side of the drain between
the yard fence & drain. Roadcap
went home with me. Don't know
why he didn't go to his own home.
I was with him till 9 or 10 o'clock
next day. We separated at my house.
I was sober that night. Charlie
had been drinking some but I saw
nothing to make me think he was
drunk. Ritchie was intoxicated.
I think Dove was outside of Louse
when I went out; I think I met him
coming in at door. Roadcap & I come down
stairs together & by time I got out to end

of ~~fact~~ he was coming out of door.
Roadcap never showed me knife or
anything of that kind after we left - Here
& I saw none in his land that night.
That night going down the road
Roadcap told me he cut at Ritchie
& that he didn't know whether he
cut him ~~out~~ or not. Don't know just
where it was on the road he told
me this. Didn't say where they were
when he cut at Ritchie. I first
found out that Ritchie was dead
yesterday morning about 8 or 9 o'clock
on the road near Phil Hoorn's.
Roadcap was with me and Clint
Dean. Mrs Hoorn told us of it.
After leaving this we went on piece, as
far as John Turner's, we were on
our way to store. Roadcap said
let's go on back up over come back
& I went to my house & he went on
to his. Don't think Roadcap told
me what part of Ritchie's body he
cut at. Roadcap said he had
to do something that Ritchie was
resting on him. That's about all
I remember his saying. Don't remem-
ber what he said or whether he
said anything about it after he
learned Ritchie was dead. Don't
remember his saying anything

Ab. Donovan

Dont remember whether there was a light-
 down stair when Roadcap + I came
 down but - I dont - think there was -
 The moon was shining. No fire
 shining in store that I remember.
 Ritchie did not say why he wanted
 Roadcap to get out. Mrs Caldwell
 is Ritchies daughter. Her husband
 was not here that night. There children
 were there. I did not see Mrs Caldwell
 nor the children after we came down
 stairs.

I went with Roadcap toquire Coopers
 yesterday evening. Clint Bean + Cal
 Bean were along. I ^{went up} ~~got up~~ ^{went up}
 to Roadcaps with Cal + Clint Bean
 We went up there to talk to Roadcap
 Dont know that we went to talk
 about anything in particular.

Clint Bean proposed that we go up
 there. He + his father were at my house
 at the time. Had not gone in particular
 to talk about this difficulty but we
 talked about it. We told Roadcap
 we believed it would be best
 for him to go + give himself up to the
 magistrate. I didnt see Ritchie strike
 Roadcap at all. Saw Ritchie strike at
 Roadcap a time or so. - Abner Donovan

Mrs Eva Caldwell. Phil Ritchie
is my father. My husband is away
been away four weeks. Have 3 children
The oldest - was 6, the 26th of Sept, the next
was 3 the 26th of July & the baby was a
year old Nov. 3^d.

When father come he called for me
to make a light - & I did so. He
asked who was up stairs. I said
Charlie Roadcup & Abbie Donovan.
Then father called for Charlie, & he
said Phil what did you do to
you. Father swore & said "don't
make a God damn bit of differ-
ence. Come on down here or I will
kill you". I saw father strike at
Charlie at the door. Saw no one
strike at father. Saw no knives or
nothing of the kind. Father broke the
lamp when he come in but the wick
was still burning ^{when they come down} & some one was
holding it. I was in the room
when they come down. Didn't notice
when Dore went out. Didn't see
Donovan go out. I looked towards
the door & Pa was striking at
Roadcup. Cant say whether that
is the stick Pa had or not - but
it looked larger to me. When I
looked around father's back was
towards me. Didn't see father
I had a Roadcup. Didn't

see what took place on the outside
of the house. When I looked around
Roadcap was already outside of the
door on the porch. None of the
children were in the room here during
the difficulty. Father aint say to
Roadcap or I heard why he
wanted him to get out of here.

Roadcap was tight. I went after he
got here. I got tired staying up
& I told Charlie to go up stairs &
go to bed & he done so & I went
to bed downstairs. Donovan come in
afterwards. I saw him when he come
in. I was afraid to stay by myself.

After father had freed Charlie
out he come back & I went in
to the child that was crying. I
heard father ^{snoring} like he was asleep
& I laid still. It was not very
so long before any light. I found father
was dead. Dove called me & I
said get pap up & take him home
& he said I believe he is dead
& I got up soome out.

This was the second time Roadcap been
to my house since husband was gone.
So far as I know Roadcap & pap
never had any difficulty before this.
Don't know that he objected to Road
cap coming here. I was in the room
from the time Roadcap & Donovan come down here

They went out - & I saw no difficulty - nor
my own strike till saw John hit at
Roadcap at the door. When Charlie
came down pop said Charlie get out
of here & Charlie said Phil wait
till I get my hat - & he got his hat
out of the cradle next to the door
I was standing by the stove.
Fisher was drunk that night.

J. Cabin Bear - I was at Ab Donnans
yesterday morning. Had heard of Ritchie
being dead before went there. Talked
to Donnans about it. He said Ritchie
and Charlie Roadcap had had a
difficulty the night before & that Roadcap
was talking about leaving. My son
& Ab & I went up to Roadcaps.
Talked there to Roadcap about Ritchie
& about the racket - & Roadcap said
he & Phil had a racket & he had
to defend himself. Roadcap said
he cut him but didn't know how bad.
Said Ritchie was after him with a
club - said didn't know whether to leave
or not. I told him best go to
Cooper & give himself up. He finally
decided to do that & I went with
him Ab & my son also went.

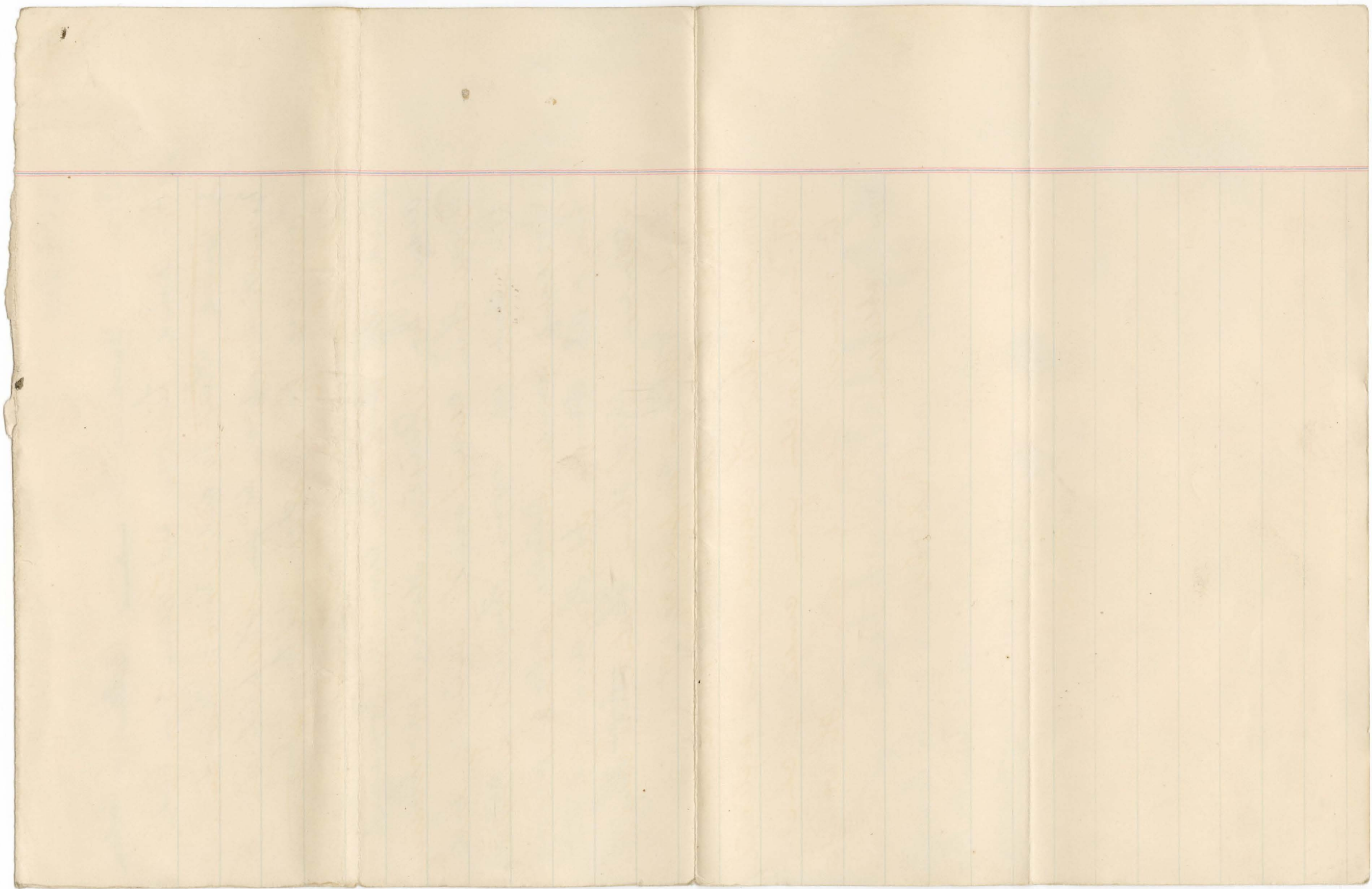

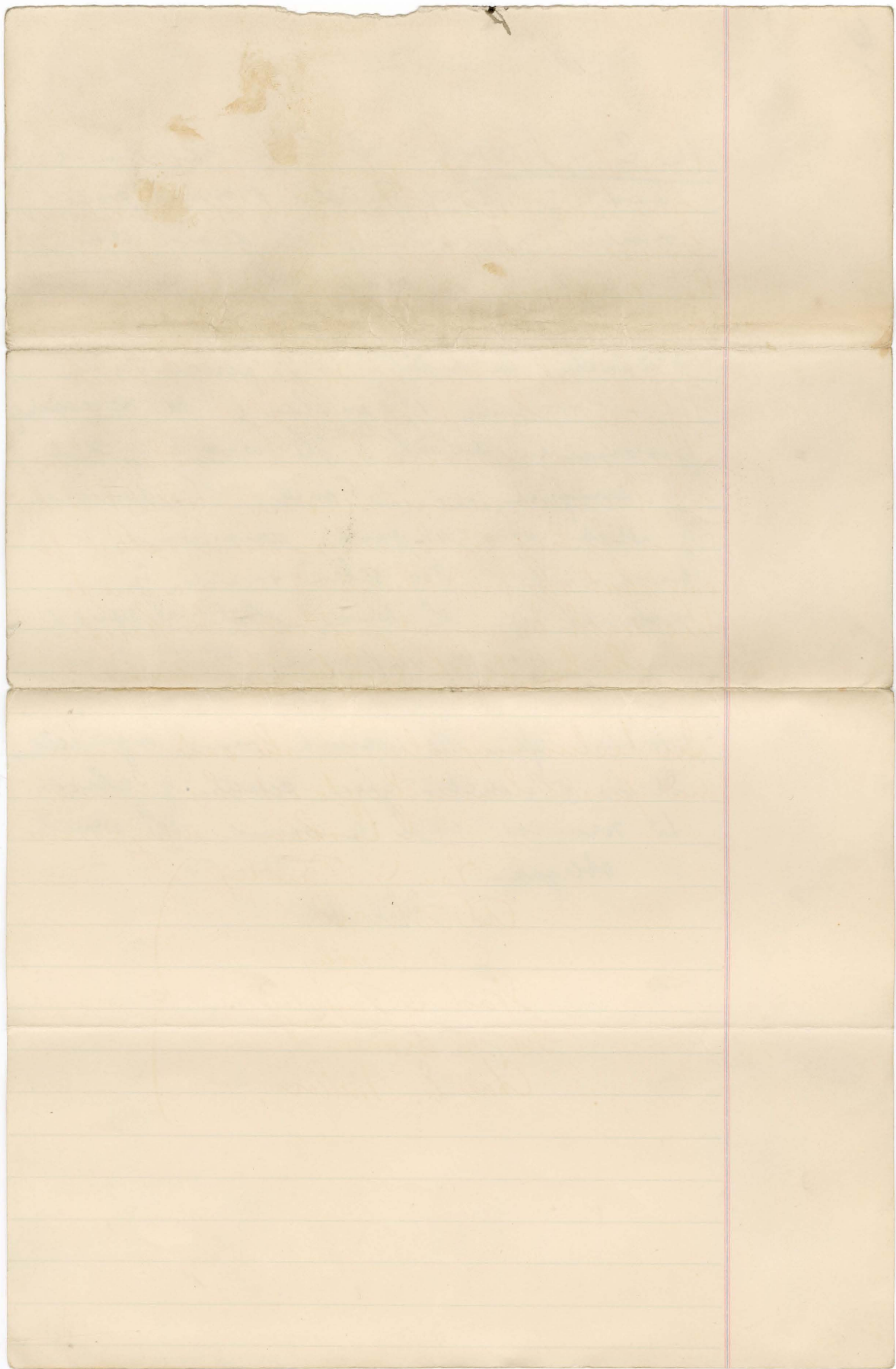

Dr. C. S. Dodd. I have examined
body of Philip Ritchie & made post-
mortem examination. The death was
caused by a stab which penetrated
the heart-muscle. The stab was
 $3\frac{5}{8}$ inches in depth. It penetrated
heart-muscle $1\frac{5}{8}$ inches. It-messing
produced death. The width of stab
at surface is $\frac{7}{8}$ inch. The direction
of stab was inward, downward &
backward. No other mark of
violence on the body that I could
find. It is improbable that he
could have lived over 10 or 15-
minutes after the wound was inflicted.
It is $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches from center of chest-
to nearest edge of wound. The wound
is oblique.

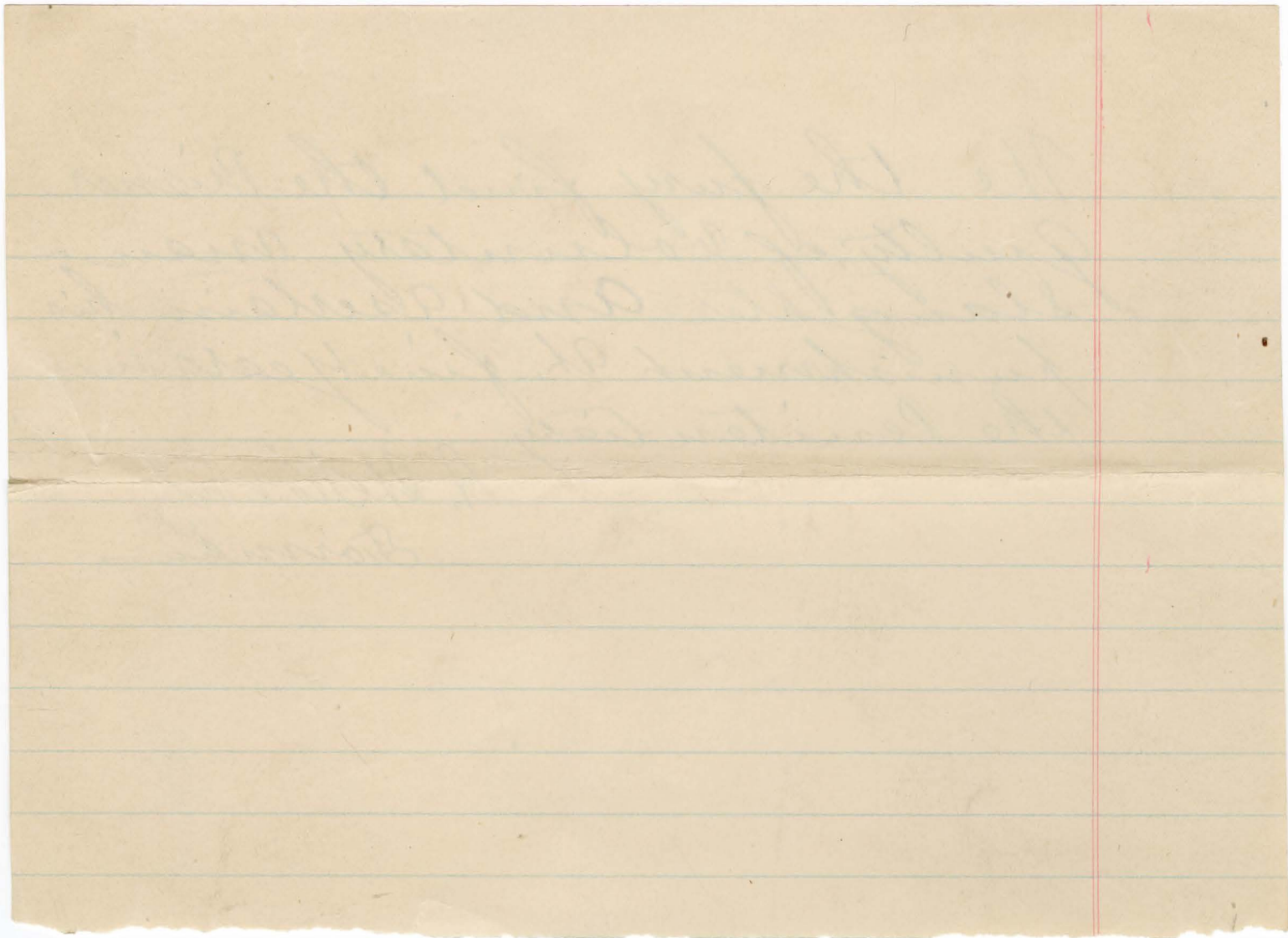
