COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA,

COUNTY OF ROCKINGHAM, To-wit:

The jurors of the Commonwealth of Virginia in and for the body of the County of Rockingham, and now attending the said Court at its January Term, in the year 1911, upon their oaths present that, on the 17th day of December, in the year 1910, there was ~~pending~~ and undetermined in the Circuit Court of Rockingham County, Virginia, a Chancery Suit wherein Michael E. Knupp was complainant and Minnie F. Knupp was defendant, in which suit the Bill theretofore filed on behalf of said Michael E. Knupp prayed that a divorce be granted said Michael E. Knupp from his wife said Minnie F. Knupp, and that among other causes assigned in the said Bill of Complaint for the granting of said divorce it was alleged in substance that said Minnie F. Knupp had committed adultery since her marriage to the said Michael E. Knupp, all of which proceedings in said suit and allegations in said Bill more fully appears by the records of said Court; that, on the 17th day of December, 1910, in the said County, said Minnie F. Knupp personally appeared before Ed. C. Martz, who was then and there a Notary Public for said County, and, ^{she} being then and there duly sworn by said Notary Public to say whether the statements contained in a certain writing then and there exhibited to her by said Notary Public were true, ^{said Minnie F. Knupp} ~~then and there made~~ ^{said} before said Notary Public, who then and there had authority by law to administer such oath, ~~and~~ that said ^{the} statements were the truth; that among ^{the} said statements contained in said writing, and the truth of which were sworn to by her as aforesaid, was the following: that the charges contained in the Bill filed by Michael E. Knupp in said suit for divorce, especially the charges relating to any misconduct on the part of the said Minnie F. Knupp, were absolutely false; that said written statement so then and there sworn to as true by said Minnie F. Knupp, was made and sworn to by the said Minnie F. Knupp for the purpose, as was then and there well known to her, of having said writing and affi-

davit presented to and considered by ^{Judge of} said Court in said Chancery
suit, and was in fact ^{Case} so presented and considered, in connection
with a motion had and made before said Court on her behalf, and
^{said statements so sworn to by her}
were relevant and material and concerning the right of said Minnie
F. Knupp to have said Court allow and decree in said Chancery suit
that said Michael H. Knupp should provide and pay to said Minnie
F. Knupp money with which to defend said suit and as alimony to her,
as more fully appears by the records of said Court; that said Minnie
F. Knupp on said 17th day of December, 1910, in said County, unlaw-
fully, wilfully, and corruptly deposed and falsely swore in making
the oath as aforesaid before said Notary Public that the charges
contained in said Bill in Chancery filed as aforesaid by said
Michael H. Knupp relating to misconduct and adultery on the part of
said Minnie F. Knupp were absolutely false, for in truth and in
fact it was not true that said charges contained in said Bill in
Chancery, filed in said Court by said Michael H. Knupp as to mis-
conduct and adultery of Minnie F. Knupp were false, whereby the said
Minnie F. Knupp did then and there upon the oath being administered
to her as aforesaid by said Notary Public, wilfully, corruptly and
unlawfully swear falsely and commit wilful perjury against the
peace and dignity of the Commonwealth of Virginia.
