Crawford's home is located approximately twenty-five yards off of Route 33 east of Elkton. When the trio returned to this home, one of Bolsey's children was playing near the gate. Morris called to the child and ask as to whether his father was visiting with the Crawford's. The child informed him that his father was there. Morris then left the car, staggered across the road and up to Crawford's home where he encountered Bolsey Shifflett. The two then became involved in an argument as to what Bolsey had told Morris's parents at their home in Stoney Point. 
